I, FAUSTO POCAR, President of the International Tribunal for the Prosecution of Persons Responsible for Serious Violations of International Humanitarian Law Committed in the Territory of the Former Yugoslavia Since 1991 (“International Tribunal”),

NOTING the “Urgent Application from the Prosecutor’s Office of Bosnia and Herzegovina for Variation of Protective Measures Pursuant to Rule 75(H)” confidentially filed on 25 February 2008 (“Application”) in which the Prosecutor’s Office of Bosnia and Herzegovina seeks the variation of protective measures ordered by the International Tribunal in this case;¹

CONSIDERING Rule 75(H) of the Rules of Procedure and Evidence of the International Tribunal, as amended on 12 July 2007;

NOTING the judicial authorization issued by the Court of Bosnia and Herzegovina on 21 February 2008;²

CONSIDERING that due to the death of the accused on 14 March 2006, all proceedings in this case were terminated;³

HEREBY ASSIGN, with immediate effect, Trial Chamber III to consider the Application.
